

# Acts 27:20

Authorized King James Version (KJV)

And when neither sun nor stars in many days appeared, and no small tempest lay on us, all hope that we should be saved was then taken away.

## Analysis

---

**When neither sun nor stars in many days appeared**—Without celestial navigation, ancient sailors were utterly lost. The Greek *epikeimenēs* (lay on us) pictures the tempest's oppressive weight. **All hope that we should be saved was then taken away** (περιηρεῖτο)—passive voice indicates hope was stripped from them by circumstances, not merely abandoned. This nadir of human despair sets the stage for God's intervention through Paul's angelic vision. The sailors' professional hopelessness makes Paul's subsequent prophecy more striking—divine revelation supersedes earthly expertise.

## Historical Context

---

Ancient navigation depended entirely on sun and stars for position-reckoning. Multiple days of storm clouds meant the ship drifted blindly, potentially hundreds of miles off course. The Adriatic Sea (v. 27) had treacherous currents and hidden shoals. This historical detail validates Luke's account as genuine eyewitness testimony.
