And it came to pass, that the father of Publius lay sick of a fever and of a bloody flux: to whom Paul entered in, and prayed, and laid his hands on him, and healed him.

Analysis

The father of Publius lay sick of a fever and of a bloody flux (πυρετοῖς καὶ δυσεντερίῳ)—medical terminology describing gastric fever and dysentery, common Mediterranean ailments. Luke the physician's precise description suggests chronic, life-threatening illness. Paul's response: **entered in, and prayed, and laid his hands on him, and healed him** (προσευξάμενος ἐπιθεὶς τὰς χεῖρας αὐτῷ ιάσατο). Note the sequence: prayer first (acknowledging God's power), then laying on hands (apostolic sign gift), then healing (God's action). Paul doesn't heal by inherent power but as Christ's instrument. This healing reciprocates Publius' hospitality, demonstrating kingdom gratitude and opening doors for broader ministry (v. 9).

Historical Context

Dysentery was endemic in Mediterranean regions due to poor sanitation and contaminated water. Malta's geography made medical care limited. The combination of fever and bloody flux often proved fatal in the first century. Paul's healing would have been seen as miraculous deliverance from near-certain death.
