## Analysis

**And the name of the other was Eliezer; for the God of my father, said he, was mine help, and delivered me from the sword of Pharaoh**—Eliezer's name (אֵלִיְזָר, 'God is help') contrasts with Gershom's alienation theme—though stranger, Moses found divine help. The naming reference 'God of my father' invokes patriarchal covenant (Abraham, Isaac, Jacob), showing Moses' connection to Israel's lineage despite Midian residence. The phrase 'delivered me from the sword of Pharaoh' likely refers to Moses' flight after killing the Egyptian (Ex 2:15). These two names encapsulate Moses' theology: alienation (Gershom) met by divine rescue (Eliezer). Together they preview Israel's story: though exiled, God delivers. Christ fulfills both names: Immanuel ('God with us') joins our exile and delivers from death.

## Historical Context

Eliezer's birth in Midian marked God's protection of Moses during his fugitive years. The name testified to God's faithfulness even when Moses lived outside the covenant community in Egypt.
