Therefore his height was exalted above all the trees of the field, and his boughs were multiplied, and his branches became long because of the multitude of waters, when he shot forth.

Analysis

The cedar grew 'higher than all the trees of the field'—Assyria surpassed all nations in power and glory. The source: abundant waters (God's provision). Yet height and prosperity contain seeds of pride. The 'boughs multiplied' and 'branches became long' depict expansionism and imperialism. Unchecked growth without accountability to God leads to overreach and fall.

Historical Context

Assyria's empire at its height (circa 660 BC under Ashurbanipal) extended from Egypt to Persia, from Anatolia to the Persian Gulf. This unprecedented reach made them the ancient world's superpower—until God determined their time was finished.
