

# Job 19:7

Authorized King James Version (KJV)

Behold, I cry out of wrong, but I am not heard: I cry aloud, but there is no judgment.

## Analysis

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'Behold, I cry out of wrong, but I am not heard: I cry aloud, but there is no judgment.' Job's complaint: he cries 'wrong' (חָמָס, chamas—violence), but receives no hearing (אָמַרְתִּי לֹא, lo e'anah); he cries aloud (אָשָׁבָה, ashava) but gets no 'judgment' (מִשְׁפָּט אֵין, eyn mishpat). This echoes Habakkuk 1:2—'why dost thou show me iniquity and cause me to behold grievance?' Job accuses God of judicial failure—not hearing cries for justice. This is scandalous speech, yet Scripture preserves it. The Reformed tradition distinguishes between expressing feeling (legitimate) and theological declaration (requiring accuracy). Job feels unheard; eventually God answers. But God doesn't condemn Job for expressing this feeling. Faith can cry 'God doesn't hear!' to God.

## Historical Context

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Ancient legal culture required judges to hear cases and render judgment. Job uses legal language to accuse God of failing basic judicial obligations, a shocking claim in ancient context.
