If I have made gold my hope, or have said to the fine gold,
Thou art my confidence;

Analysis

Job denies trusting in wealth: 'If I have made gold my hope, or have said to the fine gold, Thou art my confidence.' This oath distances Job from idolatry of wealth. Material blessing didn't become spiritual substitute for God.

Historical Context

Ancient wisdom warned against trusting wealth (Proverbs 11:28). Job's oath affirms he avoided this temptation despite great prosperity.

Additional Cross-References

Psalms 52:7 (Creation): Lo, this is the man that made not God his strength; but trusted in the abundance of his riches, and strengthened himself in his wickedness.

Proverbs 11:28 (Parallel theme): He that trusteth in his riches shall fall: but the righteous shall flourish as a branch.

Psalms 62:10 (Parallel theme): Trust not in oppression, and become not vain in robbery: if riches increase, set not your heart upon them.

Psalms 49:17 (Parallel theme): For when he dieth he shall carry nothing away: his glory shall not descend after him.

Proverbs 10:15 (Parallel theme): The rich man's wealth is his strong city: the destruction of the poor is their poverty.
