Chapter 40 of 42 \cdot 24 Verses \cdot Authorized King James Version

The Lord Continues: Will You Condemn Me?

- ¹ Moreover the LORD answered Job, and said,
- ² Shall he that contendeth with the Almighty instruct him? he that reproveth God, let him answer it.
- ³ Then Job answered the LORD, and said,
- ⁴ Behold, I am vile; what shall I answer thee? I will lay mine hand upon my mouth.
- ⁵ Once have I spoken; but I will not answer: yea, twice; but I will proceed no further.
- ⁶ Then answered the LORD unto Job out of the whirlwind, and said,
- 7 Gird up thy loins now like a man: I will demand of thee, and declare thou unto me.
- ⁸ Wilt thou also disannul my judgment? wilt thou condemn me, that thou mayest be righteous?
- ⁹ Hast thou an arm like God? or canst thou thunder with a voice like him?
- Deck thyself now with majesty and excellency; and array thyself with glory and beauty.
- ¹¹ Cast abroad the rage of thy wrath: and behold every one that is proud, and abase him.
- Look on every one that is proud, and bring him low; and tread down the wicked in their place.

- ¹³ Hide them in the dust together; and bind their faces in secret.
- ¹⁴ Then will I also confess unto thee that thine own right hand can save thee.

Behold Behemoth

- ¹⁵ Behold now behemoth, which I made with thee; he eateth grass as an ox.
- ¹⁶ Lo now, his strength is in his loins, and his force is in the navel of his belly.
- 17 He moveth his tail like a cedar: the sinews of his stones are wrapped together.
- ¹⁸ His bones are as strong pieces of brass; his bones are like bars of iron.
- ¹⁹ He is the chief of the ways of God: he that made him can make his sword to approach unto him.
- ²⁰ Surely the mountains bring him forth food, where all the beasts of the field play.
- ²¹ He lieth under the shady trees, in the covert of the reed, and fens.
- ²² The shady trees cover him with their shadow; the willows of the brook compass him about.
- ²³ Behold, he drinketh up a river, and hasteth not: he trusteth that he can draw up Jordan into his mouth.
- ²⁴ He taketh it with his eyes: his nose pierceth through snares.

HEBREW & GREEK WORD STUDIES

Confess — יַדַה (Yadah)

To confess, praise, give thanks

The Hebrew **yadah** (תַּה) means to confess or give thanks—acknowledging truth openly. 'He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy' (Proverbs 28:13).

(Kavod) כַּבוֹד (Kavod

Glory, weight, honor

The Hebrew **kavod** (קבוֹד) literally means 'weight' or 'heaviness,' metaphorically denoting glory, honor, or majesty. God's glory (Shekinah) filled the tabernacle (Exodus 40:34) and temple (1 Kings 8:11).

God — אַלהים (Elohim)

God (plural of majesty)

The Hebrew **Elohim** (אֱלֹהִים) is a plural form denoting majesty and fullness of deity. Though grammatically plural, it takes singular verbs when referring to the one true God, suggesting the Trinity's plurality within unity.

Judgment — מִשְׁפֵּט (Mishpat)

Judgment, justice

The Hebrew **mishpat** (מִשְּפֵט) means judgment or justice—God's righteous decisions and ordinances. God is the Judge of all the earth who 'shall do right' (Genesis 18:25), executing perfect justice.

Justify — צָדַק (Tsadaq)

To be righteous, declare righteous

The Hebrew **tsadaq** (צְּדַק) means to be righteous or to declare righteous—a legal verdict of innocence. Abraham 'believed in the LORD; and he counted it to him for righteousness' (Genesis 15:6).

Lord — יָהוָה / אֵדֹנֵי (YHWH / Adonai)

The LORD / Lord

When 'LORD' appears in small capitals, it represents the Tetragrammaton **YHWH** (יְהוָה'), God's personal covenant name meaning 'I AM.' When 'Lord' appears normally, it's **Adonai** (אֶדֹנָי), meaning 'my Lord,' emphasizing sovereignty.

Save — יַשע (Yasha)

To save, deliver, rescue

The Hebrew **yasha** (יָשַׁע) means to save or deliver —rescue from danger or distress. This is the root of 'Jesus' (Yeshua), meaning 'YHWH saves.' God alone is Savior: 'I, even I, am the LORD; and beside me there is no saviour' (Isaiah 43:11).

Wrath — אַף (Aph)

Wrath, anger

The Hebrew **aph** (אַר) literally means 'nose' or 'nostrils,' idiomatically expressing wrath or anger —God's righteous indignation against sin. Yet God is 'slow to anger' (Exodus 34:6) and 'abundant in mercy.'
