Analysis

"Moreover the LORD answered Job, and said." After the first divine speech (chapters 38-39), God continues. The repetition of "the LORD answered" emphasizes that Yahweh Himself speaks—this is divine revelation, not human philosophy. The conjunction "moreover" (va, !) indicates continuation. Job sought answers from God (23:3-5); now God graciously responds, though not with the explanations Job expected. The verse reminds readers that God condescends to engage with human questions, even when His answers reframe the entire discussion.

Historical Context

In ancient Near Eastern cultures, deities rarely explained themselves to humans. Yahweh's extensive speeches to Job demonstrate His unique willingness to engage with His creatures. This self-revelation distinguishes biblical faith from pagan religions where gods remained distant and arbitrary. God's continued speech shows patience with human questioning.
