

# Job 42:6

Authorized King James Version (KJV)

Wherefore I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes.

## Analysis

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Job's climax: 'Wherefore I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes.' This doesn't repent of supposed sins but of presumption in demanding answers. Job's self-aborrence reflects proper perspective before divine majesty.

## Historical Context

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Ancient Near Eastern mourning practices included dust and ashes. Job's posture represents humility and recognition of creaturely limits.

**Job 9:31** (Parallel theme): Yet shalt thou plunge me in the ditch, and mine own clothes shall abhor me.

**Jeremiah 31:19** (Repentance): Surely after that I was turned, I repented; and after that I was instructed, I smote upon my thigh: I was ashamed, yea, even confounded, because I did bear the reproach of my youth.

**Matthew 11:21** (Repentance): Woe unto thee, Chorazin! woe unto thee, Bethsaida! for if the mighty works, which were done in you, had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes.

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
