Additional Cross-References

Matthew 16:9 (Parallel theme): Do ye not yet understand, neither remember the five loaves of the five thousand, and how many baskets ye took up?

Mark 7:18 (Parallel theme): And he saith unto them, Are ye so without understanding also? Do ye not perceive, that whatsoever thing from without entereth into the man, it cannot defile him;

Mark 9:32 (Parallel theme): But they understood not that saying, and were afraid to ask him.

Luke 18:34 (Parallel theme): And they understood none of these things: and this saying was hid from them, neither knew they the things which were spoken.
