

# Psalms 106:21

Authorized King James Version (KJV)

They forgat God their saviour, which had done great things in Egypt;

## Analysis

---

This verse describes the theological amnesia underlying the golden calf sin. 'They forgat God their saviour' uses shakach (שָׁכַח), the same 'forgot' as verse 13. Forgetting God isn't mere mental lapse but willful ignorance and practical atheism. 'God their saviour' (El moshiam, אֱלֹהֵינוּ מוֹשִׁיעַ) emphasizes that the One they forgot was their Redeemer. The verse then catalogs what they forgot: 'great things in Egypt' (the ten plagues), 'wondrous works in the land of Ham' (Ham being Egypt's ancestor, Genesis 10:6), and 'terrible things by the Red sea' (the sea-splitting and army-drowning). Despite these recent, massive demonstrations of power, they forgot. This teaches that human memory of God's works is tragically unreliable without the Spirit's sustaining work.

## Historical Context

---

The golden calf was made mere months after the Red Sea crossing and plagues. The generation that witnessed God's greatest Old Testament miracles forgot Him almost immediately. This shows that witnessing miracles doesn't produce lasting faith—only regeneration by the Spirit creates enduring trust. Deuteronomy repeatedly commands 'remember' and 'don't forget' (Deuteronomy 6:12; 8:11-14), recognizing human tendency toward forgetfulness.
