

Psalm 72:12

Authorized King James Version (KJV)

For he shall deliver the needy when he crieth; the poor also, and him that hath no helper.

Analysis

The king delivers 'the needy when he crieth' and 'the poor also, and him that hath no helper.' Christ's reign especially benefits the powerless—those with no human advocate find divine champion. This reveals God's heart for the vulnerable and marginalized. Jesus's ministry consistently elevated the lowly (Luke 4:18), and His kingdom reverses worldly power structures (Luke 1:52-53). The gospel reaches those who recognize their spiritual poverty and need for a Savior.

Historical Context

Ancient kings typically served the wealthy and powerful who could provide military support and tribute. God's king inverts this pattern, prioritizing those society devalues—orphans, widows, poor, foreigners.

Additional Cross-References

Job 29:12 (Parallel theme): Because I delivered the poor that cried, and the fatherless, and him that had none to help him.

Psalms 102:17 (Parallel theme): He will regard the prayer of the destitute, and not despise their prayer.

Hebrews 7:25 (Parallel theme): Wherefore he is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him, seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them.

Luke 4:18 (Parallel theme): The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised,

Psalms 102:20 (Parallel theme): To hear the groaning of the prisoner; to loose those that are appointed to death;
