

Psalms 97:1

Authorized King James Version (KJV)

The LORD reigneth; let the earth rejoice; let the multitude of isles be glad thereof.

Analysis

This enthronement psalm begins with the proclamation 'The LORD reigneth' (Yahweh malak), establishing divine sovereignty as the foundation for all that follows. The call for the earth to rejoice (samach) and the 'multitude of isles' (coastlands—representing distant nations) to be glad demonstrates that God's reign is universal, not merely local. This cosmic perspective anticipates the Great Commission and the gospel's spread to all nations. True joy originates from recognizing God's rightful rule over all creation.

Historical Context

Written when Israel was a small nation among great empires, this psalm boldly declares Yahweh's supremacy over all earthly powers, prefiguring the universal kingdom of Christ.

Matthew 25:31 — Final judgment

Revelation 20:12 — Judgment according to deeds

1. How does acknowledging God's reign over all nations affect your prayers for current world events?
2. What would it look like for you to live with consistent joy grounded in God's sovereignty rather than circumstances?

Additional Cross-References

Colossians 1:13 (Kingdom): Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son:

Psalms 99:1 (Kingdom): The LORD reigneth; let the people tremble: he sitteth between the cherubims; let the earth be moved.

Zephaniah 2:11 (References Lord): The LORD will be terrible unto them: for he will famish all the gods of the earth; and men shall worship him, every one from his place, even all the isles of the heathen.
